

# **Impact**

The Thurston EDC continues to lead economic growth by fostering partnerships and creating opportunities for businesses to thrive locally. The successful operation of the organization is built upon a funding model that incorporates private business support and membership, earned income, and public sector grants and contracts. These dollars are put to use in our dynamic workplan to ensure that we retain the businesses operating in the community, expand market opportunities, and the recruitment of new fiscal resources and businesses into the community.







# **BIPOC Business Initiative**

Building equity in entrepreneurship is at the heart of Thurston EDC's mission. Through strategic focus areas and partnerships, this initiative is removing barriers and empowering diverse voices in the local economy. We're committed to reaching young BIPOC adults in high schools and colleges, showcasing business ownership and leadership as viable pathways. Initiatives like the Latinx Youth Summit, SPSCC Pathways, and campus engagements are sparking new possibilities for aspiring entrepreneurs.

- **426 interactions** supporting existing BIPOC businesses
- **70 interactions** nurturing BIPOC startups
- Collaboration with community organizations like CIELO, Korean American Chamber of Commerce, and Mi Centro de la Raza.

# **Agriculture Innovation Park**

By creating spaces for agri-businesses and innovation, the Agriculture Innovation Park is revitalizing South Thurston County. With its upcoming opening, the park will be a hub of opportunity and local pride.

- **\$6M invested** in projects employing **20 local contractors**.
- **6 tenants ready** to occupy the first two buildings in 2025.
- Projected \$15M in economic impact by 2026.

# Washington APEX Accelerator

The APEX Accelerator team of 17 advisors has a significant impact on the economic vitality of our communities. Through quality one-on-one advising services, training, and events that connect government buyers to businesses, Washington's businesses are able to diversify their clientele to include the public sector agencies at the federal, state, and local level.

Last year, APEX Accelerator rebranded from PTAC to better align with our federal funding partners at the US Department of Defense Office of Small Business Programs. The new, elevated partnership with the Department of Defense has already led to an enhanced ability to support non-traditional contractors seeking to sell to DoD.

- Hosted 180 training courses for businesses entering the public sector
- Supported \$21 million in innovative business awards
- Achieved a 98% satisfaction rate from clients
- \$6M in construction-related projects boosting local businesses
- 2,469 clients supported through the Washington APEX Accelerator
- 3,764 jobs created
- ROI: For every \$1 invested, \$375 was returned in economic value
- Total contracts awarded: \$546 million

# Lacey MakerSpace

The Lacey MakerSpace (LMS) is a community-driven innovation hub dedicated to empowering creators, entrepreneurs, and small businesses in Thurston County and beyond. This innovative facility, a product of the partnership forged between the City of Lacey, Saint Martin's University and the EDC, provides access to state-of-the-art tools, equipment, and training in areas such as woodworking, metalworking, 3D printing, and design.

By fostering collaboration and hands-on learning, LMS supports local artists, makers, and small business owners in developing their skills and creating marketable products. With a strong emphasis on education and economic growth, the MakerSpace has become a vital resource for individuals seeking to turn their ideas into reality, promoting innovation, sustainability, and community development.

- Expanded to 8,000 sq. ft. to serve creators and businesses thanks to a \$1M grant from the US Economic Development Agency
- Delivered 116 classes with 307 attendees
- Supported 50+ business projects ranging from prototyping to fabrication
- Academic collaboration and workforce development with Evergreen State College, Saint Martin's University, and South Puget Sound Community College
- A new partnership with AJAC Advanced Manufacturing Apprenticeships
- Introduction of the Timberland Regional Library membership package, expanding our reach and accessibility
- STEM/STEAM Partnership Programs with Olybot Robotics Club, Timberline Robotics Club, as well as an Adaptathon event with Sensory Tool House



The Washington Center for Women in Business (WCWB) continues to be a catalyst for women entrepreneurs, providing the tools, resources, and support they need to succeed. From personalized coaching to community-focused events, WCWB fosters economic growth and empowerment across our region. **WCWB's efforts led to:** 

- \$529,400 increase in client profits
- 484 hours of client contact time
- 448 counseling sessions provided
- 140 new client coaching sessions

# Building Stronger Communities Together

STEDI has continued its mission of fostering collaboration and driving economic growth in South Thurston County. More than two dozen county and regional organizations convened monthly to share resources, forge partnerships, and advance our regional economy.

- Generated over \$100,000 in sales at the Tenino Arts holiday and spring markets.
- Secured grant to launch the Tenino Creative District's metal art banner project, showcasing 23 beautiful installations.
- Facilitated \$39,000 grants each for three STEDI members from the Washington State Department of Commerce.

### **Center for Business & Innovation**

The Center for Business & Innovation (CBI) continues to be a driving force for entrepreneurship, offering tailored programs that support business growth and innovation. From aspiring entrepreneurs to established business owners, the CBI's programs provide accessible, high-quality resources to foster success statewide.

- **240 participants** engaged in the **Intro to Business** course a no-cost, on-demand or instructor-led virtual course offered in Hindi, Korean, Spanish, and Vietnamese.
- 145 entrepreneurs participated in Business Enterprise Startup Training (BEST). BEST helps entrepreneurs
  navigate the critical elements of business startup through five on-demand courses. \$65,105 in scholarships was
  awarded, thanks to funding from the Cities of Lacey, Olympia, and Tumwater.
- This year, 44 small businesses completed the Business TuneUp course, focusing on accounting, operations, and marketing, with \$8,756 in scholarship support from the Cities of Lacey, Olympia, and Tumwater.

ScaleUp is Washington's premier small business growth program, administered by CBI and funded by the Washington State Department of Commerce, who provided \$435K in scholarship funding. 153 small business owners graduated this year, of which 78% were women-owned businesses and 38% were minority-owned businesses.

# **Our Economic Impact**

As the state-designated economic development agency for Thurston County, we take our mission to create a vibrant economy that serves the population of Thurston County seriously. That's why the Thurston EDC is continuously innovating to find new avenues to strengthen and diversify our local economy.

This year we are celebrating 5 years of conducting economic impact analysis on our organization and we are pleased to announce that our 5 year economic impact now stands at nearly \$1 billion in total output, over 3,800 jobs and more than \$256m in labor income.

We use the IMPLAN input/output model to quantify our total economic impacts. IMPLAN allows us to quantify how our economic activities cascade through the regional economy by showing us how our activities effect supply-chains and consumer demand.

# April 2023 - April 2024 Impact

For the most recently completed year our organization has continued furthering the health of Thurston County's economy by adding an additional 380 jobs, \$25.9m in labor income and \$71m in total economic output.

We do that through our interactions with businesses of all sizes. This year we had over 1,500 touch points with local businesses, 426 of which were BIPOC owned, 619 were woman owned and 238 were veteran owned.

In 2023-2024, for every dollar invested in the Thurston Economic Development Council by our funders we returned \$7.38 back to our community in increased prosperity.

### Research

The Thurston EDC continues to provide and develop robust research and analysis products that serve Thurston County and Washington State. Increasingly, communities from all over Washington State reach out to the Thurston EDC research team to answer their economic curiosities.

Thurston County's economy continues to offer a robust COVID recovery as evidenced by the latest issue of our Economic Vitality Index. This year, we've added new socioeconomic indicators to our report that help move the EVI into a new era that speaks to community health in addition to economic health.

Our economic impact reports continue to be in high demand with new interest coming in from major local financial institutions to quantify the impacts of their community investments. As we move into 2025 we look forward to measured and reasoned discussion on how the City of Olympia tackles the minimum wage increases and providing actionable insights for councilmembers to incorporate into their discussion.

### **SW WA Food Hub**

Strengthening local food systems, the SW WA Food Hub has grown its reach and impact significantly this year, fostering connections between farmers, schools, and businesses.

- Expanded school district participation by nearly 150%, now including 13 districts in farm-to-school programs.
- Launched the Youth Farmers Market in collaboration with WSU, SNAP-Ed, and Olympia School District, engaging 155 students from a Title 1 school.
- Workplace Wellness: 18% growth in participation in the Farmshare Box Program.
- Purchased a refrigerated box truck and large walk-in cooler with a WSDA Infrastructure Grant, enabling expanded regional delivery routes.
- Farm to School Success: Over 40% increase in school districts sourcing local food.
- Producer Participation: 30% growth in producer membership, driving local economic growth
- Injected over \$2M into the local food economy through tribal partnerships.
